Introduction

This is our inaugural first edition of the Health Education Unit newsletter. The Health Education Unit at Kawana Waters State College (KWSC) was opened in 2017 where we welcomed 18 students. Our college is the health hub for over 15 schools on the Sunshine Coast including three state high schools in Rockhampton. Today we have over 300 students enrolled and 6 dedicated teachers and trainers delivering these courses.

Students who are enrolled in the Health Education Unit courses can complete one or more nationally recognised certificates. These certificates are:

- Certificate II Health Support Services
- Certificate III in Health Services Assistance
- Certificate III in Health Services Assistance (Assisting in nursing work in acute care)

We currently work with a number of aged care facilities on the Sunshine Coast and some of our Health Education Unit trainers work at these facilities as well. Our trainers work closely with Connect & Grow (Registered Training Organisation). These trainers ensure students are trained and competent when they complete their work placement in an aged care facility along with knowing they will be able to enter the work force confidently whether it be as an Assistant in Nursing (AIN), to pursue a career in other medical vocations or continue their studies at university.

First Aid Course

During Term 1 and Term 2 all students who are completing the Certificate III in Health Services Assistant participated in the new HLTAID012 Provide First Aid Course. The maturity of these students has been impressive as well as their genuine interest in learning new functional skills such as CPR, defibrillation, management of bleeding, snake bite, asthma, anaphylaxis and choking. The day long, hands-on course offered an opportunity for Health Trainees to interact, in scenarios, with patients in their time of need and it was encouraging to observe their genuine compassion and empathy for their patients.

Attention was given to develop understanding of the need to address their own safety as well as the safety and well-being of others with a focus on preventing or reducing the harm of emergencies. At the conclusion of the day students expressed personal satisfaction with their new skills and their increased confidence in assisting others in the community, at a time of need. All students passed their assessments with flying colours. Our health students are now prepared to step into any emergencies requiring first aid.

Clinical Skills Workshop

Within the Certificate III Assistant in Nursing, lab skills are being performed on a weekly basis to teach students the practical knowledge required to this qualification. Students undertake a number of skills such



as blood glucose recording, manual handling skills utilising full patient hoists, standing hoists and slide sheets, bed making, wound dressing and clinical observations.

Assistant in nursing enrichment program

Enrichment = Opportunities

As an Assistant in Nursing (AIN) it is preferable that the individual is job ready and able to fulfil the role of an AIN when successful in gaining employment. In order to boost confidence and increase nursing skills within the AIN scope of practice, the more exposure a student receives can enhance an individuals' performance. Kawana Waters Care Community (Opal) and Kawana Waters State College have created a supportive enrichment program open to Kawana Waters State College Health Program students to gain invaluable training and skills within the area of aged care.

This program commenced at the start of term 2 this year and has allowed a number of students to attend on a Tuesday morning each week with Helen Knowles in attendance, to provide all activities of daily living for a number of elderly residents in the facility. The students assist in the provision of all cares such as, hygiene cares, assisting with mobility and mobility aids, technical skills, observational skills, assisting with food and fluids including the serving of food and assisting to feed residents in the dining room. Students are accepted on the program via an Expression of Interest (EOI) process that is open to all health students studying in the Certificate III program.
