A gentle reminder to families that VET qualifications should ideally be completed by the end of Term 3—particularly for Year 12 students—to ensure their results contribute to their QCAA accounts in time for graduation.

Lastly, we want to highlight the recent update regarding Career Ready funding. Originally set to begin on January 1st, 2026, this funding has now been extended by 12 months following extensive feedback from schools. This extension allows continued access to VET in Schools (VETiS) funding, supporting our students' vocational education pathways.

Thank you to everyone who contributes to making our VET program a success. Together, we are preparing our students for a bright and capable future.

At Kawana Waters State College, our aim is to assist all students in gaining a meaningful career pathway, whereby students can follow their passion and work towards their chosen career pathways.

In Semester 1, twenty students commenced school based traineeships

and apprenticeships in a variety of industries. We have seen an increased interest in students seeking apprenticeships in Carpentry, whilst the Electrotechnology pathway continues to be favoured by many students seeking a trade pathway. For those students seeking a VET pathway, we strongly encourage students to consider completing VET qualifications either at KWSC, the Sunshine Coast Technical Trade Training Centre, Tafe or other registered training organisations and most importantly 'trying before they buy' by doing work experience in an industry that they may be interested in. Work experience is highly valued at KWSC as students are able to gain 'real world' experience. All students in Year 10 are required to complete five days of compulsory work experience and with Deputy Principal approval can do further work experience on a case-by-case basis.



Year 10 Work Experience Program - student article



During Week 10 of Term 2, I was lucky enough to have the opportunity to complete my work experience at Kawana Private Hospital with Sunshine Coast Anaesthetics Group. My aspirations for this career only grew, as I was able to have firsthand experience in the surgery rooms. I talked to patients before

their surgery that ranged from children to the elderly. This gave me a greater understanding of how to communicate with patients, as my supervisor gave me wonderful advice that I will use in the future.

I was able to watch how the needles were prepared before the patient came in and learnt about all the different drugs that are used in anaesthesia. I also learnt how to feel

the patient's breathing and could see their breath filling the oxygen bag. One of my favourite parts that gave me skills for the future was watching how the anaesthetist put the breathing tube down the patient's throat once they were asleep. It is so interesting to see how they skilfully manoeuvre the flexible laryngeal mask into the patient's hypopharynx to make a seal, which creates an airway so they can easily ventilate the patient.

Through work experience, I was able to see what my life might look like if I pursued this career and was able to ask deep questions that only a real anaesthetist could answer. I loved hearing everyone's unique stories about the different pathways they took to get to where they are now. It was extremely insightful and gave me lots of ideas that I hadn't considered about which pathway I want to take. I observed many different types of surgeries including cataracts in the eyes, grommets in the ears, wisdom teeth removals and plastic surgeries. The knowledge I have gained from my work experience is truly invaluable. This experience has confirmed for me that I definitely would like a career in medicine!

1. Why did you choose a School Based Greenskeeper Apprenticeship?

When I was first looking at starting an apprenticeship becoming a greens keeper didn't really come to mind. I had really wanted to do a landscape construction apprenticeship, as that's

what I did for my week of work experience in Year 10 and I thoroughly enjoyed it. At the start of Year 11 someone I knew worked at Pelican Waters Golf Course and asked if I would be interested in starting a school-based apprenticeship. I decided being able to get out of school one day per week and being outdoors was a good idea, so I took the job.

2. Favourite part of your job?

Seeing the sun rising throughout the colder months is awesome - most people are still in bed but I'm already at work. Another thing would be seeing the hard work and time you put into completing a job and then being able to step back and admire the task you just completed.

3. Least favourite part of your job?

Because you are the apprentice you do get given all the jobs that no one else likes doing. You get used to being in bunkers (the sand pit things) multiple times a week, all day in the middle of summer makes for a very long hot day. However, you have to do your time before you start to get the good jobs.

4. When do you finish your apprenticeship?

I will be a fully qualified greens keeper by April next year with a Certificate III in Sports Turf Management.

5. Any advice for current students to consider if they are considering being a Greenskeeper?

Do it. Having a qualification means you can travel anywhere in the world and get a job. By having a Certificate III in Sports Turf Management doesn't mean you can only work on golf courses; you can get jobs anywhere. From a racetrack, to stadiums, athletic centres. Having a qualification that covers such a wide variety of work locations means you always have an opportunity to change it up.
